

As we celebrate Women's History Month in the Year of the Woman, I am reminded of the many important contributions of women throughout history. Here in the Mount Vernon District, that impact is well documented. It was the Ladies of Mount Vernon that recognized the importance of honoring our first President through preserving George Washington's Estate. They took action to preserve, restore and maintain this historic property for all to experience the lives of George and Martha Washington, their families and their heritage. On August 26, 2020, we will gather to celebrate the opening of the Turning Point Suffragists Memorial at Occoquan Regional Park on the 100th

Anniversary of passage of the Women's Right to Vote. Today, women across the state are still working to ensure the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), an effort which was first proposed by the National Woman's political party in 1923. In January, Virginia became the 38th state to ratify the ERA.

I know many of you are concerned about the spread of the Coronavirus disease (COVID-19). At this time, there are no known cases in Fairfax County, or Virginia. The Fairfax County Health Department is working closely with the Virginia Department of Health and our local healthcare community to limit the spread of Coronavirus that began in Wuhan, China. The Health Department will continue to monitor the situation and will keep the public informed. The best source of information is the County's webpage that will be updated regularly and includes steps to help prevent the disease. I will share new information as it becomes available. The Board of Supervisors will be briefed by Dr. Addo-Ayensu at 10 a.m. on Tuesday at the Board meeting. Watch live on Channel 16. In addition, Congressman Don Beyer's town hall on March 10 at 7 p.m. at Gunston Hall will include a short debrief by Fairfax County Health Department's Director, Division of Epidemiology and Population Health on Fairfax County efforts to contain COVID-19.

I hope you will join me throughout the month as we host two Teen Job Fairs at South County High School on March 7 from 2 – 4 p.m. and Mount Vernon High School on March 21 from 10 a.m. – noon. Then bring your furry friends to enjoy a playful afternoon at the Ides of Bark Dog Festival on Sunday, March 29 from 1 – 4 p.m. at Grist Mill Park! Coronavirus (CONVID-19)

What You Need to Know about the Coronavirus (COVID-19)



Coronavirus disease, also known as **COVID-19**, is an illness that was first detected in Wuhan, China in December, 2019. It has since spread all over the world. **Teams of researchers across the globe** are working together to learn more about the illness, how it spreads, and how to stop it.

In Fairfax County, as well as in all of Virginia, Maryland and Washington D.C., there have been **no documented COVID-19 infections**. Fairfax County Health Department (FCHD) continues to work with the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to respond to the expanding global outbreak and to **prepare for the possibility** that cases will occur in our area.

We are working closely with health care providers, and public health and safety partners to quickly identify people who may have been exposed to coronavirus disease. We are taking appropriate public health actions and working with the CDC to test people for COVID-19 as needed. If a person is diagnosed with COVID-19, we will then work with the patient, their medical provider, and their family to treat the illness and isolate the individual. We are prepared to respond to a COVID-19 outbreak if it happens.

Coronaviruses, like other respiratory viruses, **spread from an infected person to others through:**

- the air by coughing and sneezing
- close personal contact, such as touching or shaking hands
- touching an object or surface with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes

In certain locations where there are diagnosed cases of COVID-19, there are some people **infected with the virus who are not sure how** or where they became infected. This is called "**community spread**" and it means that COVID-19 is not just occurring in people who have traveled from other countries, but is **present in the community**. However, in other communities, including Fairfax County, the **risk to the general public remains low**.

Respiratory illnesses typically cause more severe illness in older people and those who have underlying health conditions, and coronavirus disease is no different. Steps you can take to prevent spread of respiratory illnesses like the flu and the common cold will also help prevent coronavirus disease: • wash hands often with soap and water. If not available, use hand sanitizer avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands cover your mouth/nose with a tissue or sleeve when coughing or sneezing avoid contact with people who are sick • stay home while you are sick and avoid close contact with others It is also suggested that you plan your travel carefully. The CDC has issued travel notices for places where the virus is spreading. Travelers should review the CDC's quidance for more information. Currently, there are no vaccines available to prevent coronavirus disease. The Fairfax County Health Department encourages everyone in our local community to separate facts from fear and quard against stigma as we fight the COVID-19 outbreak together. There is no reason to treat people of a certain race or ethnicity differently. no reason to assume they have or can spread COVID-19, and no reason to avoid businesses owned by people of a certain race or ethnicity because of fear of COVID-19 infection. Misinformation about coronavirus can create fear and hostility that hurts people and makes it harder to keep everyone healthy. We can fight stigma and support others by sharing accurate information and staying informed through reputable, trusted sources. Interactive Story about the Historical and Current County Demographics

An Interactive Story about the Historical and Current Demographics of Fairfax County is available online. In 2019, Economic, Demographic and Statistical Research, Department of Management and Budget, conducted a study to understand the underlying assumptions of the historical population change and discuss its economic drivers. This study compiled demographic data from 1790 to date, developed a complex statistical program for trend analysis and tailored the output for Fairfax County's history. The results are in "A Look to the Past" story map that highlights how Fairfax County's population growth has intertwined with the changes of land use, economy and advancement of technology, and how demographic diversity has shaped Fairfax County to be resilient and thriving.
