This weekend, Virginia is offering parents a break from the sales tax, which means they can save money on school supplies, clothing, shoes, and even pick up a new energy efficient dishwasher without paying the 6% sales tax. The sales tax holiday includes qualifying items purchased in stores, online, by mail, or over the phone.


From Friday, August 2 to Sunday, August 4, 2019, you will not pay state sales tax on many items, including: emergency preparedness supplies, Energy Star/WaterSense items (under \$2,500), or a long list of school supplies, clothing, and footwear.

- 8. Reconnect with someone or make new connections.

- 10. Check your mood online.

Key Findings & Data from the 50+ Community Survey



The Board of Supervisors was presented with a collection of key findings and data from the <u>50+ Community Survey</u> on July 16, 2019. The purpose of the survey was to assess the local lifestyles, community perceptions, and access people 50+ have to the things they need to age the way they want to age.

Key Findings:

- Physical health is self-rated as excellent or good and performing daily tasks is not a problem.
- More then three-quarters report feeling safe in their community.
- Some concerns are expressed about the variety of housing options and the availability of quality housing.
- Nearly half of the respondents used public transportation last year.
- Most survey respondents rate Fairfax County favorably as a place to live overall.
- More than half of respondents are likely to remain in the county throughout retirement, but less than half view it as a good place to retire.
- Less than 15 percent consider the cost of living in the Fairfax County area as good.

Tree Care Spotlight



Right Tree, Right Place

Trees provide numerous benefits to properties and the environment. Many trees can live for generations which makes the species selection process very important. When planted in an unsuitable location trees may cause problems over time.

It is important to choose a tree that is appropriate for the planting space so it will not struggle in the existing environment, such as the tree in the photo above. Since many trees live for decades, consider the mature height and spread of the tree. This should include adequate soil volume to feed the tree and anchor its roots. Think of the individual adaptions and preferences of the tree as part of the "Right Tree, Right Place" selection criteria. A good place to start a search for the right tree is from a <u>list of native trees</u> (page 46).

The Green Column

As the world market for recycled materials continues to evolve, the <u>Department of Public Works & Environmental Services</u> (DPWES) has updated its recycling flyers. Remember to place acceptable items in your bin loose, clean, and dry, not in plastic bags.



RECYCLING RIGHT IN FAIRFAX COUNTY



The curbside recycling bin program is designed to collect specific materials. The list below includes recyclable items you should always place in the bin. Keep them *loose, clean, and dry* – never in plastic bags. Placing unaccepted material or wet, dirty, sticky items in the bin reduces the recyclability of other material. You may leave lids and labels on containers. If you are unsure if something is recyclable in the bin, remember, "When in doubt, throw it out." To avoid creating litter, use a lidded container. Private collection companies who serve our community take recyclables to sorting facilities. These facilities often have different lists of acceptable items for recycling. The items below are universally accepted and should ALWAYS be placed in the recycling bin.

*For specialty items such as food containers like tubs, clamshells and other plastics, please contact your hauler.



Glass bottles and jars placed in the curbside bin currently pass through the sorting process as waste. That is anticipated to change as recycling companies upgrade their sorting equipment. For now the best option for recycling glass bottles and jars is to bring them to purple, glass-only containers located in Fairfax County, Alexandria, Arlington, and Prince William County.

Some things should never be placed in the curbside recycling bin. Plastic bags can be returned to grocery stores, and clothing, shoes, and small appliances can be donated.



Some things are recyclable but not in the curbside bin program. The *I-66 transfer station* in Fairfax and the *I-95 landfill complex* in Lorton accept phones and electronics, paint, batteries, household hazardous waste, scrap metal, cooking oil, motor oil, and much more. Proper disposal of this material protects collection workers and the environment.
